





How We Study History

- History- The study of the past
 - There are two types of people who study history
 - Historians: learn from written sources
 - Primary source: written by people who were there
 - Secondary source: written by people who learned their information from a primary source
 - Archaeologists: learn from things that people leave behind
 - Artifacts: objects that are made by humans
 - Fossils: the ancient remains of things that once lived





- Boys can choose an artefact that reflects their experience of living through Covid. It can be anything they choose, as long as they can explain why they choose it. This is important as it is the provenance or origin of the source e.g. provides the who, why, when, what and where of the source's origin.
- If it is a big item, you may need to take a picture of it!
- Boys should select their item and write an explanation of their choice. It can be handed into the box in Front Hall. If their item is selected by the committee it will go into the time capsule.
- A group of boys from across the school year groups will make the selection and help us bury it in the school grounds next term.
- Once buried it will not be dug up for at least 100 years!
